196	VA	III	Level III trauma centers, through an organized trauma response, can provide prompt assessment, resuscitation, stabilization, emergency operations and also arrange for the transfer of the patient to a f

207	WI	II	Hospital provides the initial definitive trauma care regardless of the severity of injury, but differs from Level I in teaching and research capability.
208	WI	III	Hospital provides assessment, resuscitation, stabilization, and emergency surgery and arranges transfer to a Level I or II facility for definitive surgical and intensive care as necessary.
209	WI	IV	Facility provides stabilization and advanced trauma life support prior to patient transfer to a Level I or II.
210	WI	UNCLASSIFIED	Hospital has chosen not to be part of the Trauma Care System or has not been approved as a Level I, II, III or IV.
211	WV	I	A Level I center is a tertiary care facility central to the trauma care system. The center must provide leadership and total care for every aspect of injury, from prevention through rehabilitation.
212	WV	II	A Level II center is a facility that is also expected to provide initial definitive trauma care, regardless of the severity of injury. The Level II center can be an academic institution or a public or private comm
213	WV	III	A Level III center is a facility which serves communities that do not have immediate access to a Level I or II institution. A Level III facility can provide prompt assessment, resuscitation, emergency operat
214	WV	IV	A Level IV center is a facility which provides advanced trauma life support prior to patient transfer in remote areas where no higher level of care is available. It is the de facto primary care provider.
215	WY	RTC	Regional Trauma Center (derived from ACS Level II). Able to initiate definitive care for all injured patients.
216	WY	ATH	Area Trauma Hospital (derived from ACS Level III). Has demonstrated an ability to provide prompt assessment, resuscitation, surgery, intensive care and stabilization of injured patients and emergency
217	WY	CTH	Community Trauma Hospital (derived from ACS Level IV). Has demonstrated an ability to provide advanced trauma life support (ATLS) prior to transfer of patients to a higher level trauma center. It provi
218	WY	TRF	Trauma Receiving Facility (derived from ACS Level V). Provides initial evaluation, stabilization and diagnostic capabilities and prepares patients for transfer to higher levels of care.
219	ID	LEVEL III/PEDIATRIC	No definitions or definition source provided by state, however the SOURCE shown in this table was used to discover trauma levels for the hospitals feature class, minus the definition.


